"A patient who was hospitalized in June 2023 had been struggling with ongoing symptoms of depression, anxiety, psychosis, and paranoid thoughts. They were initially referred to our center in 2020, but they were not compliant with recommended treatment, and have since had multiple hospitalizations. It was identified that lack of transportation is a significant barrier that contributed to the patient's failure to attend routine mental health appointments. Transportation was provided for the patient to receive his medication and establish care with a provider. A referral was made to one of the support programs at the center to address their transportation needs, emotional support and other community resources that would be beneficial. The patient is feeling much better, acknowledges the benefit of being on medication, and hasn't had any readmissions."
