- Expanding the number of individuals and children that have access to mental health care - including prevention and early intervention
- · Expanding the number of low-to moderateincome individuals and children that have access to physical healthcare - including vision and dental care
- · Decreasing the incidents of family violence, child abuse and elder abuse
- Decreasing obesity rates by focusing on prevention and early intervention of adult and childhood obesity
- Ensuring youth and adults are able to access age-appropriate sexual health education and services
- Decreasing the use of illicit drugs and alcohol by youth and adults
- · Supporting maternal health and infant well

"A woman who was living with her abuser contacted our shelter program. The abuser had just left for work, and she knew if she wanted to leave, she had to do so within his 4-hour shift. She didn't have a car, he kept her wallet with him, and she had no friends or family to call for help. FOF staff conducted a shelter assessment and the survivor screened as lethal. FOF immediately arranged a Lyft to her location and brought her to shelter. When she first arrived, she was overwhelmed and unsure of what to do next. FOF staff worked with her to identify her goals. Once she was able to rest, we began to work with her on her goals. First, we went with her to purchase new identification and a social security card. Next, we helped her transfer her cosmetology license to lowa, giving her the ability to work again. After this, she was able to secure a job that would allow her to afford to live on her own. Then, we searched for housing that was within her budget. She identified a unit that would work for her and signed a lease. She was then able to move into housing shortly after. A few months later, she contacted us to let us know that she was still maintaining her housing and was doing well on her own."

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
